The Jack London Improvement District is committed to making Oakland's historic commercial waterfront neighborhood inviting and accessible, and supports an inclusive and resilient commercial community that values the diverse history, economies, culture and people of this place. We support the application of the City of Oakland to the United States Department of Transportation's (USDOT) National Infrastructure Project Assistance (Mega) competitive grant program for the Oakland Waterfront Mobility Hub (Project).

The Oakland Waterfront Mobility Hub will construct a highly impactful suite of improvements supporting safe and efficient goods movement and a new transit hub enhancing connections between Oakland's growing Historic Waterfront District and Downtown. With significant state and federal funding already committed, the project will fulfill Mega program goals of generating national and regional economic, mobility, and safety benefits, along with supporting safety, equity, and a resilient environment.

The Oakland Waterfront Mobility Hub is a Bay Area priority for Mega competitive grant program funds, having received regional endorsement for helping to advance the Bay Area's ambitious Plan Bay Area 2050 goals to combat the climate crisis; deliver a well-connected, safe, and multimodal transportation network; and improve access to opportunity for all Bay Area residents through the MTC's Regional Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) Grant Strategy.

The Waterfront Mobility Hub will address long-standing bottlenecks for freight and passenger rail, support multi-modal transit connections and active transportation, reduce greenhouse gas emissions and air pollutants, pave the way for affordable housing, and strengthen connectivity between Oakland communities and our waterfront, which is becoming increasingly more developed and utilized as a regional destination.

We enthusiastically support this proposal and will work in partnership with the City to implement these projects and further connectivity and mobility goals in Oakland. Thank you for your consideration,

Re: Support for City of Alameda's Alameda-Oakland Estuary Water Shuttle Pilot

Dear Ms. Lengyel:

On behalf of the Jack London Improvement District I am extending our strong support for the City of Alameda's Alameda-Oakland Estuary Water Shuttle Pilot program, for which the City is seeking grant funding from the 2024 Comprehensive Investment Plan (CIP).

The proposed two-year water shuttle pilot program will provide a sustainable, comfortable and enjoyable transportation link between west Alameda, Jack London Square and Downtown Oakland by providing free, regular weekday service, operating approximately every 15 minutes. This new service, supplemented with the existing Alameda Short Hop ferry service operated by WETA, will make crossing the estuary without a car much easier, and provide a vastly better biking and walking connection over the existing 3-foot walking/biking pathway in the Posey Tube.

High-quality, comfortable pedestrian and bicycling access between Alameda and Oakland will contribute to reducing drive alone rates, motor-vehicle involved collisions and greenhouse gas emissions. The water shuttle service will improve access to jobs, shopping, services and transit for the many current and future residents and employees living, working and recreating along and near the waterfront, in addition to improving non-automobile options for people living and working in Alameda, Oakland and beyond.

We see tremendous economic, cultural, equity, and environmental benefit from robust infrastructure connection and free water transportation between Alameda and Oakland. We are enthusiastic supporters of a bicycle and pedestrian bridge as a long term solution for sustainable and enjoyable mobility across the estuary, and encourage the Alameda CTC in its work currently underway on the bridge. The water shuttle service is the recommended medium term solution, it can be up and running within six months, and can operate indefinitely with support from the private and public sectors.

The waterfront is becoming ever-more more populated and activated as a regional destination for recreation and commerce—and a water shuttle service will be a valuable asset. Jack London Improvement District strongly supports the Alameda-Oakland Estuary Water Shuttle Pilot grant application, and is committed to helping this pilot service succeed.

Thank you for your important consideration of the change in designation of Howard Terminal, which would allow for an A's Ballpark development. We enthusiastically support the A's stadium project proposed at Howard Terminal, which has the potential to be a tremendous environmental and infrastructure improvement for our waterfront neighborhoods and an economic development catalyst for all of Oakland.

Jack London Improvement District represents property owners, hundreds of merchants, residents, and A's fans, who are eager to see the localized positive impact, and welcome the growth and investment of the ambitious and regionally significant planned waterfront development. Developing the Ballpark at Howard terminal is elevating existing issues including equity, safe mobility, rail safety, environmental quality, and access to the waterfront.
